2023 Primary Care First (PCF) National to be Held May 16th and 17th

CMMI has announced that the annual meeting for Primary Care First (PCF) practices will take place virtually on May 16th and 17th from 11 to 3 ET each day. MDHHS Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) Summit Highlights

MDHHS held a three-day SDoH Summit January 24-26 to highlight and communicate the great work across the state in better understanding and meeting the needs of people with health-related social needs. These ranged from groups tackling gaps in housing and food assistance to those transportation and so much more.

Leaders from MDHHS, the federal Department of Health and Human Services, local community-based organization leaders, health plans, as well as national experts delivered presentations and engaged the audience in discussions.

Public Health Emergency Expiration Date of May 11, 2023, Announced

The Biden Administration has announced that the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE) will end on May 11, 2023. The PHE had been in effect since January 2020 and permitted additional flexibility in Medicare policies to provide for the many changes necessary to assist with continuity of care and access to care during the pandemic. Michigan Multipayer Initiatives (MMI) has been collaborating with its participating payers and MDHHS to promote aligned post-PHE policies to decrease administrative burden, leverage the growing body of telehealth evidence, and prevent fraud and abuse. MMI is working with our Payer Partners to publish a post -PHE version of the Telehealth Policy Alignment table that will be distributed in an upcoming edition of the Primary Care Review.

In addition, the MDHHS has been preparing for the PHE expiration through its unwinding process. This will include changes impacting Medicaid program eligibility, benefits, and policies. The MDHHS PHE Benefit Changes [website](#) is a helpful resource to better understand the upcoming changes and their implications.

MDHHS Launches County Level Substance Abuse Vulnerability Index

The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) has launched a new tool, the [Michigan Substance Use Vulnerability Index \(MI-SUVI\)](#), to help stakeholders inform efforts to address substance use issues specifically facing their communities. The MI-SUVI provides community-level estimates of substance abuse vulnerability. The tool is unique because it incorporates factors such as overdose mortality, a community's access to resources, the impact of nonfatal overdoses, and social determinants of health. The index identifies Michigan's most vulnerable counties as Oscoda, Wayne, Clare, Schoolcraft, and Oceana.

With the national opioid settlement now finalized, the state of Michigan is slated to receive nearly \$800 million over eighteen years. Half of this amount will be sent directed to county and local governments. The MI-SUVI can serve as a resource to guide decisions about the use of settlement funds.

MiHIN Updates SDoH Use Case Specifications

MiHIN has revised and updated their 2022 SDoH Screening Use Case specifications. The [updated use case specifications](#) expand response options to describe patient sex (gender), revises screening domains to align with the Gravity Project, and capture additional elements to include screening provider name and NPI as well as the screening tool (e.g., PRAPARE, PROMIS, etc.) LOINC code.
